

Overview

The Cockatoo Island / Wareamah Draft Master Plan was publicly exhibited from 1 November to 13 December 2023, and resulted in the Harbour Trust receiving 199 unique submissions via written submissions, feedback and/or survey. The Harbour Trust will carefully consider the community's feedback before any decision is made on finalising the draft plan. This summary report provides an outline of issues raised through the consultation process.

Consultation method

The Harbour Trust used a variety of methods to engage with the community and stakeholders. This included advertising in local and metro media, signage across Harbour Trust sites, digital and physical materials, social media advertisements, ferry advertisement, an online recorded webinar, 4 drop-in sessions and a community forum. The community primarily gave feedback via the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) 'Have Your Say' consultation hub.

What we heard and the Harbour Trust's response to feedback

There was strong support for the draft master plan as a whole, with close to 60% of submitters supportive or very supportive of the plan.

Similarly, the 5 core objectives of the draft master plan were all noted to be of significant importance to respondents with almost 90% of respondents saying that 'Conserve, protect and interpret the World Heritage value' was important or very important to them.

There were also very high levels of satisfaction with the response to the 4 historic themes included as part of the draft master plan. More than three quarters of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied that the draft master plan addressed the theme 'Convicts, prisoners and school children'.

Harbour Trust response to concerns:

The island could become over developed and commericalised The Harbour Trust is committed to ensuring that Cockatoo Island / Wareamah is a place for all Australian's and will ensure that accommodation and offerings consider a range of price points.

Increased impact on local residents

The Harbour Trust Events and Activation Strategy ensures that activity is compatible with the island's heritage significance, manages impacts on public access, amenity and nearby communities and transport requirements.

All activities on the island will comply with NSW EPA Noise Guidelines.

Potential impact of the new ferry wharf on harbour activity

The Harbour Trust will continue to explore this proposal with Transport for NSW to ensure that all navigational and operational considerations are satisfactorily addressed.

The draft master plan is indicative, and feedback will be taken on board at design stage. Any detailed proposal for a new wharf would be subject to further community consultation.

The Harbour Trust engaged Story Factory to bring a group of 10 culturally, linguistically and gender diverse young people, with connections to a broad spectrum of communities across Western Sydney and South Western Sydney, to the island to provide feedback on the draft master plan. The key feedback received from this group was:

- - Support for 'First Nations Connecting with Country' layer
- Concerns around the proposed hotel accommodation

- Support for the improvements to native flora and fauna on the island



- Need to ensure the island is affordable and accessible to all
- Support for the 'Convicts, prisoners, and school children' layer of draft master plan
