The Harbour Trust's Middle Head / Gubbuh Gubbuh Draft Master Plan was on public exhibition from 14 March 2023 until 9 May 2023. During this eight-week consultation period, the Harbour Trust received 209 unique submissions received via written submission, feedback or a survey.

The aim of public exhibition was to receive initial feedback and comments that would inform revisions to the draft master plan. Meaningful engagement leads to better outcomes for the community and the Harbour Trust has listened to your feedback. A revised draft master plan – that takes on your comments from initial consultation – will be re-exhibited for further community and stakeholder comment.

Consultation method

The community primarily gave feedback via the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) 'Have Your Say' consultation hub.

The Harbour Trust used a variety of methods to engage with the community and stakeholders. This included advertising in local and metro media, providing councils with information to share with residents (in all local government areas where the Harbour Trust has a site), signage across Harbour Trust sites, digital and physical materials, social media advertisements and drop-in sessions designed for the Harbour Trust to listen to the public.

What we heard and the Harbour Trust's response to feedback

The Harbour Trust is committed to revising the draft master plan based on feedback received during initial public exhibition.

Most submitters were supportive of having a draft master plan and welcomed the Harbour Trust's intention to revitalise and remediate Middle Head and improve the quality of place and visitor experience.

Where concerns were raised, the Harbour Trust has re-assessed its position based on many factors, including alignment with the organisation's objectives and the vision for the headland.

Below is a snapshot of the key themes raised during public exhibition and how these will be addressed in a revised draft master plan.

Many submissions raised concerns on the below key actions	Harbour Trust response to concern:	
Relocation of Middle Head Oval changing rooms/pavilion and re-orientation of oval	The revised master plan will propose that the sports pavilion remain in its current location, and that it will be upgraded to improve the facilities. The revised draft master plan will propose that the oval remain unchanged. There will be no reduction in its playing space, nor any re-orientation of playing fields.	
Removal of the café building/Guard House		ain in place for years to come, but its retention will be sistent with the Middle Head Management Plan.
Impact of events	The Harbour Trust respects the sensitivity of Middle Head / Gubbuh Gubbuh and its operational constraints (such as traffic generation and limited parking). The Harbour Trust will not create a purpose-made venue for large-scale events. The revised draft master plan will provide clarity on the types of events the Harbour Trust would permit on the headland, indicating that the intention is that open parkland at Middle Head / Gubbuh Gubbuh would be used occasionally (two to three times a year) for events such as heritage open days, or First Nations gatherings.
