



- 1 Colour in each pair of cards in the same colour.
- 2 Cut out your cards.
Tip: To ensure your card game lasts, you could laminate your cards.

HOW TO PLAY


- 1 You need two or more players.
- 2 Shuffle the cards and then spread them out, face up.
- 3 Spend some time memorising where each card is located.
- 4 Flip all the cards so they are face down.
- 5 Take turns to flipping two cards up at a time, and look out for a pair. If you spot a pair, put it to one side and play again. If you do not find a pair, it is the other persons turn.
- 6 The winner is the person with the most pairs at the end of the game.

DID YOU KNOW?
